CLUB CAPTAIN'S REPORT

Once again this season we had as a Club House the Nissen hut that served us to well the previous season. Whereas last season our position was north of the jetty, this season our premises were shifted to a site south of the Henley Swimming Pool. When the move was made, naturally electrical installations connected with the club were cut off. These were never connected again, and so it was with difficulty that we existed this season, as repair work to all equipment had to be carried out in strictly daylight hours.

However, on Saturday, 16th April, demolition work began on the site of our new Club House. The foreman-in-charge, Merv Butterfield, procured two pneumatic drills, sledge hammers, an oxy-torch, and a number of shovels, and the boys set-to to wreck the place. Having succeeded to the best of their ability, a bulldozer was called upon to make ready the site for the laying of the foundations. With these laid and the brick work completed, it now appears that after many years of struggling, we will be moving into our new rooms next season "for sure."

Finally, I should like to thank all those who have assisted me during the past season and I wish to thank those lads who have given their services so readily in the building of our new Club House.

Patrols.

The 1954-55 season, which has just concluded, proved to be again a record season in reference to patrol hours. Patrols were increased to five men patrols this season and were of hour and a half periods as in the previous season. Frank O'Connell gained highest patrol hours for the Senior members with 15 hours, and R. Williams patrolled 31 hours to win the Junior Trophy.

BOAT CAPTAIN'S REPORT

It gives me much pleasure to report that during the 1954-55 season the club surf boat has again honoured the club's name, both in competitive events and rescue work.

On the night of 25th January, 1955, at about 9 p.m., word was received that a young lad had been blown out to sea, on a rubber tube, from Glenelg. The direction of the wind that night meant that he would be blown towards Henley. With the aid of torches, the boat was put to sea in an effort to find the boy. After a short time, we found that our lights were useless, and the boat returned to shore.

On beaching, we found that the members on shore had acquired two spot lights from our very able Vice-President, Mr. Henry Hicks. We immediately put to sea again to continue our search, the Army in the meantime were giving valuable assistance by firing flares and lighting the water. During the search it was thought that we had found the lad, when a cry was heard in the darkness, but on flashing the lights in that direction, we found it only to be the Glenelg surf boat crew on the job.

After a two-hour search it was decided to abandon our efforts and return to shore.

On reaching the shore it was found that the lad had been found at a friend's place. I would like to thank Mr. Donnelly who was assisting us at our picture show in the club hall at the time of the alarm. Mr. Donnelly was one of the first in the boat, and was the man who controlled the lights. Once again, thanks Mr. Donnelly, and "Keep that — light over to the right."

On the competitive side this season, the boat crew, although it did not win an event, did remarkably well in the one and a half mile marathon race at Port Elliot around the island.

At this particular carnival, it was only beaten by the champion boat crew from North Woollongong, N.S.W., who have in recent years won Australian boat titles.

I must thank my assistant, Tony Park, for his sterling work on the boat, when I was not in attendance owing to my employment, and also Ray Parnell for his assistance in transporting the boat to the carnivals this season.

It has for many years been our aim to have a building, including a gear room, large enough for our boat, conveniences, and locker rooms as well as a separate floor on which we can hold drills and social evenings to raise funds for the main club house, and gear. The total floor area, when complete, will be 2,500 sq. feet, and we are greatly indebted to the Henley and Grange Council, as a council, and also to the Mayor, and other councillors, who saw fit to trust the completion of the building to members of the club.

The club undertook its own contracting and this enabled us to finalize the job at a minimum cost. If it had been a contract price the cost would have been much too great for either council or the club to undertake.

At the opening of the coming season, it is our intention to request the Mayor (Mr. D. J. Newlands) to lay the foundation stone of the new building, which we feel sure will bring credit to the town.

We must also pay tribute to the efforts of Mr. H. "Pop" Brittain, a retired bricklayer, who has completed all the brick work of our gear and locker room. "Pop" has given many hours of his time outside of his contract and has earned the gratitude of all members.

When the building is finished, there will be much to be done in the way of equipping the building with lockers, a work bench, ski racks, and conveniences, etc., which will be installed as soon as the necessary money is available.

May I take this opportunity on behalf of all connected with the club to thank Merv Butterfield for his fine effort and for the work he has done. Without his guidance and ability to get a job done, we would not see the realization of our dreams. Sincere thanks, Merv, for a job well done, which will not be forgotten and will be for ever appreciated.

This is due to the expenditure of £2,550 on the new club premises, but I am sure all will agree that our money has been well invested.
