PRESIDENT'S FOREWORD

Hello members,

I would be lying if I said the past year has been a joy to be President of this amazing club. But it certainly has taught me a few lessons and once again proven to me how many great club members we have who put up the hands to help in all aspects of the club. Our FAMILY First values as a community club have been proven over and over.

Of course, the closure of the commercial aspect of the club – and the subsequent huge financial loss this caused – is front and centre of my mind and this report. As you'll discover in the financial statements, we suffered greatly.



I have been open about how this happened and won't outline it in detail in my report. Our commercial offering was not profitable, and like many hospitality venues suffered from increased costs but has no subsequent increase in prices or reduction in labour. Unlike other venues, ours was overseen by volunteers which means there is a lag in information. This was exacerbated by no managerial P&L statements being filed.

In May, with less than two week's wages in the bank, the BoM made the courageous decision – I would say a decision a long time coming – to close the commercial aspect of the club. Since then, we have worked toward a solution that will see Henley rebound and be the jewel it has always been on the coast. We are seeking a professional partner to offer a new vision for the restaurant and bar. More will be reported as it happens.



New community initiatives include getting OSH kids down for a come and try, having little kid AusKick on the beach on Friday evenings, bringing together members on Friday nights, rallying to have our voice heard on the problem of our disappearing beach. We continued with our core sports, rebuilding the surfboats somewhat, getting more people involved in pool rescue, having a fun and competitive club championships... the list goes on and I would like to thank all the volunteers who have given their all to the club, and especially my tireless Board of Management.

Looking forward, my focus will be on these four facets: Membership, Club Spirit, Finances and the Commercial aspects of the club.

For Membership we have a working group looking to increase all membership categories with new offers and ideas – 1000 members for our Henley 100. Finances are a constant battle, but please understand that the proposed restaurant sub-lease is not going to solve it. We need sustained fundraising, sponsorships and grants to grow the club.

On Club Spirit, there isn't too many hard yards to conquer. I attended a City of Charles Sturt club workshop and came away proud that we are in a really great position thanks to the years of work done by club leaders up to this point. Our values and mission are clear: we are a family club working for and with each other to achieve our goal of keeping the public safe on our beach. We do this by developing surf life savers from Nippers to seniors.

To wrap up. We are in a position to rebuild and be stronger as we head into our centenary, but we need all club members to put their hands up and help. Please don't wait to be asked. Just start.

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VICE PRESIDENT REPORT

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
JUNIOR OPERATIONS MANAGER REPORT

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SLSSA CHAMPION CLUB – JUNIORS

At the commencement of the season SLSSA announced a new formula for determining Junior Champion Club which has historically been determined based on competition performance alone.

The idea behind this was to level the playing field and for clubs to be measured on five pillars of excellence, each having equal weight except in the case of a tie where membership retention determines ranking.

The five pillars are:

- Membership Retention
- Carnival Participation
- Sport Performance
- Nipper Program (Nipper proficiencies and Surf Ed, and AGM & volunteer accreditations)
- Sport Participation Environment (attendance and behaviour at carnivals)

Overall our ranking was 14th place which didn't meet our expectations though it was pleasing to have ranked in the top 3 for carnival participation with excellent marks for carnival attendance and behaviour.

We do acknowledge the mechanism for finalising scores where clubs are tied within in a pillar disadvantaged us this season but we feel that is something we can control going forward, and we accept there were some areas that with a little more attention will see us finish much higher up the rankings next season. We look forward to this challenge.

AGE GROUP MANAGEMENT

Our nippers continued to thrive throughout the season with the wonderful guidance, encouragement, and support of our age group managers and age team managers.

All of our participating nippers attained their respective Surf Ed awards with our U13 group completing the requirements for their SRC awards.

We continue to encourage all our nippers to keep up their physical training and remind all members of the learning opportunities in the SLSA member area.







JUNIOR CARNIVALS

Carnivals continue to be a wonderful way for our nippers and parents to bond together and for the nippers to put their competitive training into practice and support each other and the Henley SLSC team.

This season saw the continuation of the Branch Carnival concept for the second year running. The 'Northern Branch' carnival was held in November at Grange beach involving the 5 clubs from West Beach through to North Haven.

Junior Carnivals in Adelaide were held at Somerton in December and Glenelg in January. The regional junior carnival in February was to be held at Port Elliot however, the flood water through the Murray had reached the sea leaving Port Elliot unsuitable and instead the carnival was relocated to Normanville.

The weekend certainly didn't disappoint; a large contingent of Henley Juniors made the most of the weekend, heading down to Normanville for a club dinner at the Yankalilla pub Friday evening, all-in training session and BBQ lunch on Saturday before the Junior Carnival on Sunday under sunny skies.

STATE CHAMPIONSHIPS 22/23

Bronzies in training also had access to assist in their strength development for their assessment.



MASTER WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

A five member Henley team travelled to Riccione, Italy to represent us at the Master's World Championships. Our four regular competitors were joined by Don Marsh on transfer from Carlton Park, Tasmania to contribute in our team events. The championships were conducted in good weather conditions and good spirits among competitors, with our team recording many excellent results as summarised in the table below.

As a background to Don joining in with us, we first met him when he was representing Tasmania at the 1974 Australian Titles at Glenelg. He is a Life Member of Carlton Park, Tasmanian State Centre and Surf Life Saving Australia.

Competition began at the World Lifesaving Pool events. Many of the European clubs are land locked with these pool competitions being their specialty. To see their top competitors negotiate the obstacles and manikin carry etc is just amazing.





The following table sets out the results from the first three days of competition and clearly, our small team achieved some fabulous results. Neville with one podium finish, Don with two, Andrew with five and our amazing spiritual leader John with four gold, a silver, a bronze and a setting a new World Record to boot.

We had certainly put Henley in the spotlight and the camaraderie among the Australian and International Clubs was fantastic.

Conditions at Riccione Beach were pretty good with a small wave ensuring all races were flat out from the gun in an effort to gain the advantage of the wave at the finish.

FINANCE MANAGERS

REPORT



My first year as Finance Manager of the Henley SLSC has been quite the ride. As a parent involved with the Nipper program, it was an opportunity to lend my skills to Club administration in addition to water cover on weekends. I was curious to look under the hood and see how the Club was going.

During the first months, outgoing Treasurer Sue Mitchel was very generous with her time explaining how the Club finances were run and handing over club files and information. Sue had admirably managed the Club's finances through the disruptive COVID years and had done almost the entirety of the Club's grants, sponsorships, bookwork and accounting herself, an enormous task. I can't forget Sue's words during our last hand over meeting 'you will do things differently'.

Early on in the role, it was obvious that the Club required a professional bookkeeping and accounting service. The Club's accounts involve a high volume of transactions related to members activities in addition to the restaurant's business operations that include a debt to the ATO and submission of quarterly BAS. A brief was developed, and three firms submitted for the role, which resulted in Perks being selected to provide the service from 1 April 2023 to June 2024. The engagement of a bookkeeping and accounting service has been an important step in ensuring the Club's finances are presented with a standardised set of statements.

It also became obvious over the summer that the Club's restaurant was not generating revenue at the same rate that the Club had enjoyed during the years before COVID. With the assistance of the Commercial Committee headed by Grantley White and assisted by Norm Collins of West Beach SLSC. There were prolonged attempts to improve patronage, develop efficiencies in the business and improve management reporting. When it became clear the restaurant had a limited period of time that it could continue to pay staff wages, the Board of Management was informed, and the difficult decision was made to close the restaurant and stand down the staff with entitlements. With significant debts owing to food and beverage suppliers, the underperforming restaurant was a serious challenge to the financial viability of the Club as a going concern.

The latter part of the financial year became an exercise in damage control and planning the Club's financial recovery. A dedicated group of Club volunteers lead by Club President and Vice President hosted a number of members functions and ticketed events at the Club, providing vital funds to assist the Club with its winter operating costs.

Surf Life Saving South Australia were extremely helpful with the provision of a 2-year loan on generous repayment terms to repay the restaurants debts to food and beverage suppliers. Whilst the Kanini Foundation have kindly accepted the Club's request to forgo a distribution during FY24, instead directing those funds toward the interest and principal of the Club's 20-year loan.

Recently the Commercial Committee have called for expressions of interest and subsequently interviewed 5 experienced restaurateurs to run the Club's restaurant and bar in partnership with the Club. The Commercial Committee have ensured there is always space for Club members by excluding the Club training room and the Barefoot Bar from the sub-lease. The sub-lease of the restaurant will guarantee the restaurant creates a revenue stream for the Club that covers the building operating costs. It also ensures that the restaurant will be a destination dining and socialising venue for Club members and the public alike and provide additional Club revenue opportunities such as Social Memberships and apparel sales. Special mention must go to Brad Gauvin for his work coordinating the drafting of the sub-lease with pro-bono legal assistance.

It is disappointing to report that the Club ended the year with a loss of \$245,940 during my first year in the role of Finance Manager. However, during this first year I have been open and transparent with the Board of Management and the Commercial Committee regarding the Club's financial operations, and we have faced these challenges together.

It is extremely gratifying to see a core group of Club members volunteer their time, effort and intellect to collaborate and reset the future vision for the Club. I would like to especially thank Jim, Lennie and the Board of Management and the members of the Commercial Committee for their patience and support during my first year in this role.

The financial report covers Henley Surf Life Saving Club Inc (the "Club") as an individual entity. Henley Surf Life Saving Club Inc is a not-for-profit Association, registered and domiciled in Australia.

1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The board of management have prepared the financial statements on the basis that Henley Surf Life Saving Club Inc ("the Club") is a non-reporting entity because there are no users dependent on general purpose financial statements. These financial statements are therefore special purpose financial statements that have been prepared in order to meet the requirements of the *Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012*. The Club is a not-for-profit entity for financial reporting purposes under Australian Accounting Standards.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the mandatory Australian Accounting Standards applicable to entities reporting under the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012 and the significant accounting policies disclosed below, which the board of management have determined are appropriate to meet the needs of members. Such accounting policies are consistent with those of previous periods unless stated otherwise.

Statement of Compliance

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the mandatory Australian Accounting Standards applicable to entities reporting under the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012, the basis of accounting specified by all Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations, and the disclosure requirements of Accounting Standards AASB 101 Presentation of Financial Statements, AASB 107 Cash Flow Statements, AASB 108 Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors, AASB 1031 Materiality and AASB 1054 Australian Additional Disclosures. The Club has not complied in full with AASB 16 Leases in respect of the lease of the Club's premises and AASB 15 Revenue from contracts with customers in respect of membership fees that are recognised when invoiced and not over the membership period.

Basis of Preparation

The financial statements, except for the cash flow information, have been prepared on an accrual basis and are based on historical costs unless otherwise stated in the notes. Material accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented below and have been consistently applied unless stated otherwise. The amounts presented in the financial statements have been rounded to the nearest dollar.

(a) Going concern

The financial report has been prepared on a going concern basis, which contemplates continuity of normal business activities and realisation of assets and settlement of liabilities in the ordinary course of business.

The Club incurred a loss for the financial year ended 30 June 2023 of \$245,940 (2022: \$172,162) and has a net current liability position as at that date of \$80,447 (2022: \$24,397).

Notwithstanding the loss for the year and net current liability position at 30 June 2023, the board of management is of the opinion that the Club can continue to operate as a going concern after giving due consideration to the following:

1)On 31 July 2023 the Club entered into a loan agreement with Surf Life Saving South Australia Inc for \$50,000 to assist in the payment of existing creditors. The loan is subject to interest at the cash rate plus 1%, with interest payments commencing quarterly from 31 December 2023 and quarterly principal repayments from 1 July 2024. The loan repayment date is 30 June 2026.;

2)On 7 July 2023 the Club entered into a 2-year payment arrangement with the Australian Taxation Office ("ATO") for outstanding liabilities totaling \$104,411 as at 30 June 2023;

3)As at the signing of this report, the Club is in discussions with external parties for a fixed rental of the Club's kitchen and dining facilities, which will assist with cash inflows in future financial periods; and

4)The Club can maintain sufficient support from members, funders, and sponsors to cover the operating expenditure of the Club.

Given the board of management's opinion that the Club will be able to continue as a going concern, assets and liabilities have been recognised on the basis that the Club will be able to realise its assets and liabilities in the normal course of business.

(b) Revenue

Trading income

Revenue from the sale of goods or services are recognised upon delivery of goods or services to the customer.

Membership fees

Membership fees are recognised at the point in time the membership commences or is renewed by an existing member.

Grant income is recognised in the period in which the grant relates, in line with performance obligations of the grant.

Fundraising and other income

Fundraising and other income is recognised as revenue when received.

Interest Revenue

Interest is recognised using the effective interest

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

(c) Income tax

The Club is exempt from income tax under Division 50 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1997*.

(d) Goods and services tax (GST)

Revenue, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST), except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO).

Receivables and payable are stated inclusive of GST.

Cash flows in the statement of cash flows are included on a gross basis and the GST component of cash flows arising from investing and financing activities which is recoverable from, or payable to, the taxation authority is classified as operating cash flows.

(e) Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Net realisable value is estimated using the most reliable evidence available at the reporting date and inventory is written down through an obsolescence provision if necessary.

(f) Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment are carried at cost and are depreciated over their useful lives to the Club.

Depreciation

Property, plant and equipment depreciated over the asset's useful life to the Club, commencing when the asset is ready for use.

Leasehold improvements represent the total construction cost of the Club's premises and includes amounts contributed by the Minister for Emergency Services and the City of Charles Sturt as part of the redevelopment. The building is on Crown land and is leased to the Club from the City of Charles Sturt. The lease is for 10 years with an option to extend for a further 10 years, having commenced in 2013. The board of management will be renewing the lease for the further 10 years.

The leasehold improvements had previously been depreciated at a diminishing value rate of 1.75%, with no depreciation recorded prior to the 2021 financial year. An adjustment has been made to opening retained earnings in the current financial year to recognise accumulated depreciation from the commencement of the leasehold improvements useful life, at a straight line rate of 2.5% i.e. 40 years useful life. This has resulted in an additional \$567,772 of accumulated depreciation being recognised to 30 June 2022.

The useful life of the leasehold improvements has been estimated at 40 years, and not at the 20 years per the lease term. The board of management are of the opinion that given the specific nature of the leasehold improvements, that the lease with the City of Charles Sturt will be renewed in time, covering the life of the assets. If this situation should change in future financial years, the carrying value of the leasehold improvements will be adjusted accordingly.

2 Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgments

The board of management make estimates and judgements during the preparation of these financial statements regarding assumptions about current and future events affecting transactions and balances.

These estimates and judgements are based on the best information available at the time of preparing the financial statements, however as additional information is known then the actual results may differ from the estimates.

The significant estimates and judgements made have been described below.

Key estimates - impairment of property, plant and equipment

The Club assesses impairment at the end of each reporting period by evaluating conditions specific to the Club that may be indicative of impairment triggers. Recoverable amounts of relevant assets are reassessed using value-in-use calculations which incorporate various key assumptions.

Key estimates - inventory

Each item on inventory is reviewed on an annual basis to determine whether it is being carried at higher than its net realisable value.
